


**Lift up your Heads,

Psalm 24:7-10






Acknowledgement of God

Psalms 24:7-10 is about acknowledging God's ultimate sovereignty and power as the King of glory, who rules over all of creation with strength and majesty.

- **Approach**


The earth is the Lord's, and the fulness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein. For he hath founded it upon the seas and established it upon the floods.

Psalm 24:1-2





The scene is set at the gates of the ancient city of Jerusalem. Among the crowd are King David, the author of the Psalms, and a group of priests and Levites. They have come together to bring the Ark of the Covenant into the city, a sacred and joyous occasion. King David calls out, “Lift up your heads, O gates, and be lifted up, O ancient doors, that the King of glory may come in!” The priests and Levites respond with, “Who is this King of glory?” And David answers, “The Lord of hosts, he is the King of glory!” The gates swing open, welcoming the Ark and the presence of God into the city amidst shouts of joy and praise.





King of Glory!


God, often referred to as the King of glory, reminds us of His majestic and all-powerful nature in this verse. The term “King of glory” underscores God’s sovereignty and authority over all creation. God reigns supreme over the entire universe, ruling with might and power like a king over his kingdom. This verse serves as a powerful affirmation of God’s omnipotence and emphasizes the reverence and awe that we should feel towards Him.





Declaration

Psalms 24:7-10 is a powerful declaration of God's sovereignty and glory, often linked to the entrance of the Ark of the Covenant into Jerusalem, symbolizing God's presence among His people. The imagery of lifting up gates and ancient doors signifies an invitation for barriers to be removed to welcome the King of glory. These gates and doors represent obstacles that must be eliminated to allow God's presence to enter our lives. The rhetorical question posed, "Who is this King of glory?" followed by the answer, emphasizes God's strength and might, particularly in overcoming challenges and adversaries.





Make Way!

Revelation 3:20 echoes the theme of opening doors to welcome God's presence, emphasizing the importance of actively inviting Him into our lives. Similarly, Isaiah 40:3-5 speaks of preparing a way for the Lord by removing obstacles to His coming, reinforcing the idea of making room for God's presence. In our modern lives, we encounter barriers like doubts, fears, distractions, and busyness that hinder us from experiencing God's glory and strength. Just as the Psalmist calls for gates and doors to be lifted, we are urged to identify and remove these barriers to allow God's transformative power to work in our lives.



Daily Struggles

Consider a person struggling with anxiety who decides to pray daily, inviting God into their situation. As they open the gates of their heart to the King of glory, they begin to feel peace and strength, finding comfort and guidance in God's presence. This anecdote illustrates the tangible impact of inviting God into our lives and removing barriers that prevent His entry.

Psalms 24:7-10 serves as a reminder for us to actively welcome God's presence by lifting gates and opening doors, enabling us to experience His strength, might, and peace in our daily struggles and triumphs.
